

Commander's Comments

Typically the last article a Commander writes for the Squadron newsletter thanks his staff and the other Bridge Officers, talks about how the Squadron has improved over the past year, and gives support to the new Commander and staff. I don't intend to deviate from this, but do wish there was some way that I could elaborate on how I feel without seeming to go overboard.



I believe the Bridge over the past year is one of the finest we've ever had. From the beginning of my term, I said my greatest challenge for the year would be holding back/managing a highly energized Bridge. Happily, that has been a struggle. Those of you who attend the Change of Watch will hear more about how we did this year. But in the meantime, let me give you a snapshot of some of our successes this past year.

- ◊ ***Overall, our membership has increased and we have increased the number of events in which our members can participate.*** Even attendance at our dinner meetings has increased, averaging over 40 members in attendance at each dinner meeting. This is contrary USPS overall, which continues to lose membership and has less membership meeting participation.
- ◊ ***We have excelled in education.*** Although the number of students taking the ABC course was a little less than in the past, the number of students taking advanced courses has increased and interest in continuing education has increased.
- ◊ ***Financially, our Squadron is in great shape.*** At the beginning of the year, we said we wanted to give back to the members some of the excess cash we had accumulated, which we did by subsidizing three of our dinner meetings. The Treasurer has established a budget process and we track our financial condition monthly.



CRUISE AND CRUISE PLANNING

Beginning March 1, Tom and Marbeth Dietrich will be teaching Cruise and Cruise Planning. The Dietrichs have done extensive boating in various U.S. and international waters, encompassing timeframes from weeks to months. You will enjoy their wealth of knowledge and especially their delightful way of presenting the material.

The Cruising and Cruise Planning Course focuses on the planning and preparation necessary for safe and enjoyable extended cruises on both inland and coastal waters. It is designed for members who cruise either by sailboat or powerboat (owned or chartered) and covers the following topics:

DINGHY POWER ALTERNATIVES

Many of our members like to make some moderately extended cruises on their boats and therefore must contemplate anchoring at some point. To that end, many of us have a dinghy that we take along one way or the other. This being the case, we often like to have some form of motivation for the craft other than the oars for longer trips gunkholing around our chosen anchorage area.

This is typically when some aggravation begins, namely getting the dinghy motor to run reliably. With the advent of Ethanol fuels sitting on top of the historic rigors of storing gasoline for outboards, this is often the occasion for some colorful language on startup and reliable running. Now, there are a couple of very viable alternatives that are both free of these hassles.

The top photo shows the Torqeedo all electric outboard. This has a built-in battery and all up weighs right at 30 lbs. It has a range of about 10 miles (5 out & 5 back) which is typically more than enough for most anchorages. The built-in battery can easily be taken off the motor for recharging. This motor will equal the performance of a 3-hp gas outboard in terms of push. These are fairly pricy (about 2x an outboard), but if the objective is to have reliable starting, very low (no) effort, light weight, and silent running, then these are a good choice. They have proven to be very reliable. In essence, you pay a lot of money to avoid hassle.

The bottom photo shows another alternative in today's market. This is a fairly classic outboard with the major exception that it is run by Propane. At the top left of the photo, you can see the Propane cylinder laying horizontal and screwed into the motor. This means no carrying liquid fuel, easy refueling, and reliable starting. The downside of these is that they are a bit heavier and are about 10% to 15% more expensive than a conventional gas outboard of the same performance. The main advantage of this motor is the ease of starting, for which you pay a relatively small premium.

In both engine families, there is a fairly large range of power available at, naturally, a rapidly increasing expense.
